### MINUTES

A teleconference meeting of the California Authority of Racing Fairs Board of Directors was held at 12:30 P.M., Tuesday, May 7, 2013. The meeting was hosted at the CARF offices, 1776 Tribute Road, Sacramento, California.

CARF Board Directors attending: John Alkire and Rick Pickering. Joining by conference call: Chris Borovansky, Dan Jacobs and Kelly Violini.

Staff and Guests attending: Christopher Korby, Larry Swartzlander, Tom Doutrich, Heather Haviland, Amelia White, Raechelle Gibbons, Anne Grottveit, Alan Aldrich, Cindy Olsen, Janet Lockhart, Randy Magee, Richard Conway, Tom Sawyer. Joining by conference call: Barbara Quaid.

**Agenda Item 1 – Date, Time and Location of Next Meeting.** The next CARF Live Racing Committee meeting will be held June 4, 2013 in Sacramento.

**Agenda Item 2 – Approval of Minutes.** Mr. Korby wanted the minutes to reflect that he was not present at the last meeting due to a death in his family. Mr. Jacobs moved to approve the meeting minutes with that change. Ms. Violini seconded, unanimously approved.

**Agenda Item 3 – Report, discussion and action, if any, on Legislative Program for 2013.** Mr. Brown's report was included on agenda 3 of the CARF Live Racing Committee Meeting.

<u>AB 1074 (Adkins) Horse racing: statewide marketing organization.</u> Mr. Brown reported this bill is similar to CARF's bill on the marketing committee. This is a place holder being moved through the process to address any issues that might occur if and when Hollywood Park stops racing. It's not likely that this bill will continue through the end of the process at a bill dealing with the CMC.

<u>AB 1347 (Gray) Horse racing: out-of-state thoroughbred races: statewide marketing</u> <u>organization.</u> Mr. Brown reported our bill which is dealing with the CMC and which is moving along. It passed out of the policy committee and referred to the appropriations committee. It has no cost and should get through the appropriation committee without any problems. Now we can focus on any larger issues with the CMC rather than pushing back it's sunset another five years.

Mr. Korby reported that he talked with Mr. Brown about also using this bill as a vehicle for language that allows for Horsemen and racing associations to agree that ADW commissions or purses may be used to supplement the 2.5 percent simulcast expense fund if this is not sufficient enough to pay the expenses for operating the satellite network. That provision expires at the end of this year and some are concerned about the sunset. Mr. Brown agrees that this would be a good

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vehicle and he has with committee staff. Mr. Korby has talked to NCOTWINC board members and plans to follow up with the Southern California Representatives.

SB 190 (Wright) Sports Wagering. Mr. Brown reported that satellite wagering facilities continue to be included in this bill. Mr. Korby is tracking the Sports Wagering New Jersey bills and will keep everyone informed.

SB 398 (Galgiani) Horse racing: charity days: distribution of proceeds. Mr. Brown stated this bill would allow for revenues generated at charity days to be shared or allocated to non profits that benefit fairs. This bill is in the assembly and has passed the senate floor on a unanimous vote. This is a vehicle for us to use on an annual basis to create opportunities in the horseracing industry.

SB 741 (Canella) Mr. Brown reported Western Fairs governance bill has passed two policy committees, The Senate Agriculture Committee and The Senate Governmental Organization Committee. It was referred to the suspense file earlier this week in the senate appropriation committee. It has identified some costs that go hand in hand with shifting some responsibilities from the state to a district agriculture association. Mr. Brown stated that WFA/CFA are working with CARF, the Department of Finance and CDFA on those issues. CARF and CDFA continue to have discussions on use of the 1% license fee revenue that flows to the department. Mr. Brown is in the process of scheduling a meeting with Mr. Korby, Mr. Alkire, and himself to meet with CDFA.

Mr. Brown reported that the governor will issue the May revision to his budget Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. When it comes out he will let us know, but do not expect any additional cuts this time.

Agenda Item 4 – Report, discussion, and action, if any, on planning and projections for 2013 Fair racing circuit. Staff proposed to direct funds from San Mateo County Fair loan repayment funds towards a variance in projected racing expenses. Mr. Jacobs recommended the contingency be removed from the staff proposal and moved to approve the use of \$53,000.00 in unallocated funds from San Mateo County Fair loan repayment funds. Mr. Borovansky 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Motion carried.

Agenda Item 5 – Report, Discussion and action, if any, on racing dates for 2014 and beyond. Mr. Korby reported on the DRAFT racing calendars for 2014 and 2015 that were included in the meeting packet. After discussion Mr. Jacobs moved to approve support on the calendar scenarios shown below. Ms. Violini 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Motion carried with Mr. Pickering abstaining and Mr. Borovansky opposed.

Dear Members Of The Legislature:

Respectfully, we are contacting you in response to the Internet Poker draft legislative language dated May 13, 2013 developed by a number of California gaming tribes that recently has become public.

Horse Racing United (HRU) is a not-for-profit organization that represents the interests of Thoroughbred racing and breeding within California. HRU members consist of: Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, Fairplex Park, Oak Tree Racing Association, Thoroughbred Owners of California, California Thoroughbred Breeders Association and California Authority of Racing Fairs.

The California horse racing and breeding industry is responsible for the employment of nearly 50,000 Californians, including union workers employed directly by the racetracks, and annually creates \$2.46 billion in total economic impact for the State.

We are currently the only industry in California authorized to conduct online gaming, which contributes a significant and growing percentage of our industry's revenue.

Despite being the only industry authorized to conduct online gaming, HRU has consistently made it clear that it is supportive of efforts to pass legislation authorizing Internet Poker that would provide equality for all, given that such an approach is in the best interest of the people of California.

Specifically, HRU supports such an all-inclusive approach for three reasons:

First, making Internet Poker available to many entities will create a new and significant revenue source for the State, estimated to be in excess of \$300 million annually. Internet Poker would be a right being provided by the state, and, as such, should be made widely available to benefit the state fully.

Second, an Internet Poker bill that provides an even playing field for all will enable additional revenue to support existing entities that employ thousands of citizens and create jobs in California. For the California horse racing industry, it will offer much needed support that will allow it to maintain the jobs created by the industry, and to be able to compete with other states who have authorized alternative forms of gaming to support their racing.

And, third, an Internet Poker bill that allows for an even playing field is the type of bill that will generate the broad-based support that is required of such legislation. We appreciate that in a democracy it is important that various sides come together to pursue a constructive approach where everyone can participate. Out of a desire to support passage of a bill, HRU has not adopted the position that the horse racing industry alone – despite its special online status – should have exclusive rights to Internet Poker. We realize such an approach would be neither constructive to passing legislation nor conducive to the best interests of the state. In short, it is our belief that Internet Poker is an opportunity where the many, and not just the few, should be able to participate.

By demanding exclusivity, this tribal draft legislative language fails in that it does not serve the best interest of California when it comes to generating revenue; it also does not serve the best interests of California when it comes to protecting existing jobs and economic development; and it does not serve the best interest of California

when it comes to an approach that would generate broad-based support for the legislation by allowing for greater participation.

HRU looks forwarding to continuing our support for an approach to Internet Poker that represents the best interest of the state and all of our members are committed to assisting with the legislative process in a constructive manner.

We deeply appreciate your efforts to date and look forward to working with you to find a solution that is truly in the best interest of all of California.

**Summary:** Current law prohibits a private employer from requiring or requesting an employee or applicant for employment to disclose a username or password for the purpose of accessing personal social media, to access personal social media in the presence of the employer, or to divulge any personal social media. This bill would apply the provisions described above to public employers. The bill would state that its provisions address a matter of statewide interest and apply to public employers generally, including charter cities and counties.

In an effort to accommodate the owners, trainer, and jockeys, the Sonoma County Fair would like to enlist the services of Vicki Layne as Paymaster of Purses. We believe that it would be in the best interest of the entire racing industry to have the continuity of one single Paymaster for the summer fair meets. In addition, our payment for the contracted services of Vicki will reduce the daily costs to the other fairs for these services provided by CARF. We would expect to contribute to Vicki's employment expenses, would provide lodging and are willing to pay a reasonable premium above the amount to be charged member fairs of CARF.

Please let me know no later than May 15th if we could work together on this issue for the benefit of all our stakeholders.

This is written in response to your letter to CARF regarding Paymaster services, received by us on May 2.

In January of this year, Sonoma indicated that it was considering withdrawing from CARF management services. In response, CARF made two requests to Sonoma to meet with Fair staff and with appropriate Fair Board members to address the services provided by CARF and to ensure that Sonoma had all available information in moving forward with its decision. Sonoma refused and in response demanded a 15 % reduction to the 2013 CARF budget that had already been approved by the CARF Board.

In February, the Sonoma Fair Board, voluntarily and on its own initiative, voted to withdraw from using CARF management services. At the February CARF meeting, you informed CARF that Sonoma had reviewed the duties and responsibilities that this decision would require Sonoma to take on. You also informed CARF that Sonoma was certain that it had the resources and ability to conduct its Live Racing operations more efficiently if it did not use CARF employees or services.

Sonoma's actions caused the CARF Board serious concern regarding potential liabilities to CARF through acts of omission or commission by Sonoma as a result of its withdrawing from the use of CARF management services. Subsequently, CARF and Sonoma negotiated a Separation Agreement signed by both parties, effective as of April 2, 2013. This Separation Agreement ended Sonoma's membership in CARF. In keeping with Sonoma's wishes, the agreement also memorialized Sonoma's acceptance of complete responsibility and liabilities for the conduct of its racing meeting in 2013. Significant CARF time and resources have gone into this transition.

Now, a month to the day after the Separation Agreement went into effect, CARF has received a request from Sonoma to provide a service that Sonoma specifically and unilaterally rejected thirty days earlier. Sonoma now cites its concern regarding the "continuity" of services and programs provided for horseman as the basis for this sudden turnaround. We would note that CARF management has provided continuity of services and programs to Sonoma and other Northern California Fairs for over twenty-five years. Regrettably, in this case, changes in continuity of services provided to horsemen at Santa Rosa have come about as a result of actions by Sonoma County Fair.

In any event, there cannot be an integrated continuity in the Paymaster function because there is no longer any financial connection between Sonoma and CARF. Regardless of the person or entity which actually provides the Paymaster services, Sonoma will require new accounts and separate IRS reporting for 2013.

When Sonoma decided to cease using CARF management services, it also walked away from access to management personnel, programs and services long provided by CARF. Financial underwriting of purses will no longer be available from CARF. Going forward, it will be up to the CHRB and other industry stakeholders to assess whether Sonoma has made adequate provision of qualified and suitable replacements for important functions such as race track safety and maintenance, underwriting of purses, distribution of parimutuel revenues, simulcast coordination, etc. As we attempted to point out on multiple occasions, the services previously provided by CARF will now become the responsibility of Sonoma County Fair.

It's important to convey that Sonoma's recent actions have cost CARF considerable time effort and money, including a substantial sum in attorneys' fees. In addition, Sonoma's departure will cause other Fairs additional expense by changing the allocations for shared expenses.

Your letter came too late to be included for our May CARF Board meeting agenda. We have sent your letter to legal counsel for review and, if appropriate, will include the matter at the June meeting for discussion by the CARF Board.

There appears to be a misunderstanding of my letter dated May 2, 2013 regarding CARF Paymaster, Vicki Layne. When I stated that we "would like to enlist the services of Vicki Layne" it was for her time only; I was not requesting use of CARF's Paymaster account or incompass account.

It is my understanding that Ms. Layne occasionally works other meets either as the Paymaster or Assistant Paymaster, so it appears this concept of her working outside of the CARF member program has been approved in the past. She is a CARF employee, not a contractor; so I am assuming it is up to you to determine if we can contract with CARF for her services. If you see it differently and we can contract directly with her, please let me know.

Regarding the services needed, we will only require Ms. Layne to physically be at our facility during our live meet and we will provide all equipment and space necessary to complete her duties as required for our meet. In addition, we will gladly provide the space and/or connectivity needed for her to manage the CARF paymaster program and services for it's member fairs while she is at our facility. Further, she will need to perform paymaster duties prior to and after our meet and I fully understand that we will need to pay for these services. In 2012, we paid \$17,557 (includes Admin Fees) for Ms. Layne's services as a member of CARF, and I am assuming the contract amount we will pay CARF will be adjusted for the amount of work to be performed and our non-member status.

To reiterate, the Sonoma County Fair has a Paymaster bank account established, which includes the start up funds necessary to distribute purses. We have also contracted with inCompass Solutions for the RTO and Horsemen's Bookkeeper systems and are aware that IRS and other reports are due by year's end. These reports will be processed by our accounting department so that we do not impose on Ms. Layne for these services. We initiated contact with you for the aforementioned services for two primary reasons:

- Convenience for the horsemen that follow the northern California fair circuit by allowing them uniformity and ease of dealing with the same contact person for accounting purposes and management. For example, the account transfers between Cal Expo to Santa Rosa and Santa Rosa to Ferndale.
- The ability for CARF to reduce the daily costs to their member fairs through Sonoma County Fair's reimbursement for Vicki Layne's expertise and services.

I am sure you know that our industry partners are very supportive of my suggestion that we use Ms. Layne's services for our meet and I hope we can reach a mutually agreeable solution.

According to your letter, you will need to take this to your June 4<sup>th</sup> Board meeting. However, since I clarified that we are only looking to contract for personnel services and nothing more, and since it appears the decision to do this with other meets has not gone to the CARF Board for approval; I would hope you could make an executive decision on this request prior to June.

### SECURITY AGREEMENT [OR MOU] BETWEEN CALIFORNIA AUTHORITY OF RACING FAIRS AND \_\_\_\_\_\_ FAIR REGARDING ALLOCATION OF PARIMUTUEL COMMISSIONS

This SECURITY AGREEMENT (hereinafter referred to as "Agreement") is made as of the first day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2013, by and between the California Authority of Racing Fairs ("CARF") and the \_\_\_\_\_\_ ("Fair"), and approved by the California Department of Food and Agriculture ("CDFA") pursuant to its authority in California Business and Professions Code § 19622.2, collectively referred to hereafter as "Parties."

### RECITALS

WHEREAS, CARF and Fair, as separate legal entities, carry on various activities throughout the year in accordance with the laws, bylaws, and procedures governing each.

WHEREAS, by way of the Amended and Restated Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement ("JPA") executed July 7, 1989, CARF provides necessary services to Member Fairs, by contract or otherwise which may include, but are not limited to; centralized government affairs representation, reports and analysis of the fair and horse racing industry, administration of joint services of CARF including planning, budgeting implementation and fund accounting. These programs include but are not limited to the joint purchase of supplies, materials, services and equipment in the support of the simulcast wagering facilities and programs, racing operations of the Member Fairs and other related activities; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the above services, CARF underwrites racing expenses for Member Fairs that conduct live racing at their facilities ("racing expenses") and from time to time will loan money to Member Fairs for capital projects and other matters that benefit racing operations for the Member Fairs ("loan"); and

WHEREAS, CARF receives payment from Member Fairs by way of payment of member dues ("dues") as well as [payment of printing costs for the official program business operated by CARF in southern California ("payments")] **(Omit??)**; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the JPA, CARF is responsible for the distribution of parimutuel commissions to Member Fairs; and

WHEREAS, Fair is a \_\_\_\_\_, governed by \_\_\_\_ pursuant to California Business & Professions Code section \_\_\_\_\_ which provides the CDFA with the authority to require district agriculture associations to meet all applicable standards prescribed by CDFA.

WHEREAS, CARF and Fair desire to enter into a [memorandum of understanding] security agreement setting forth the agreement between Fair and CARF to allocate funds owed to CARF by Fair for racing expenses, loans, dues, and payments pursuant to the JPA and desire CDFA oversight of this transaction.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants set forth herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. <u>Services.</u> Pursuant to the JPA, CARF shall provide the services detailed in Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein ("Services") for the 2013 Live Racing Meeting to be conducted at Fair on \_\_\_\_\_\_. Fair desires that CARF underwrite the racing expenses associated with these Services and agrees that these expenses will be paid for from pari-mutuel commissions, payable to Fair by CARF.

2. <u>Payment.</u> CARF shall withhold <u>\_\_\_\_\_</u>% (percent) of the pari-mutuel commissions owed to Fair until a final reconciliation is provided, typically by February 15 of 2014. After receipt of this reconciliation, Fair shall have 30 (thirty) days to approve the payment to CARF of the remaining racing expenses which CARF shall deduct from its final payment to the Fair. Said Approval will not be unreasonably withheld by the Fair.

[3. <u>Mediation</u>. In the event of any claim or dispute arising from this agreement, the parties shall first attempt to resolve the matter over a period of thirty (30) days before resorting to arbitration, litigation or mediation. Nothing in this provision, however, shall prevent either party from bringing suit in equity in a court of competent jurisdiction at any time.]

4. <u>Representations and Covenants.</u> Fair represents and covenants to CARF as follows:

a. The execution and delivery of this Agreement by or on behalf of Fair has been duly authorized by all necessary action of the governing body of Fair, and Fair has obtained such other approvals and consents as are necessary to consummate this Agreement, and

b. Fair will promptly and duly execute and deliver to CARF such documents, instruments and assurances and take such further action as CARF may from time to time reasonably request in order to carry out the intent and purpose of this Agreement and to establish and protect the rights and remedies created or intended to be created in favor of CARF

5. <u>Default.</u> Any of the following events shall constitute a breach of this Agreement by Fair: (1) the failure of any of Fair's representations or warranties set forth in Section \_\_\_\_\_ to be true and correct in any material respect at any time during the term of this Agreement; or (2) the Failure of Fair to pay to CARF the Racing Expenses required to be paid by Fair under this Agreement. The following events shall constitute a breach of this Agreement by CARF: failure to perform any of CARF's obligations and responsibilities under this Agreement, including the Services identified in paragraph one.

6. <u>Rights and Remedies.</u> On the occurrence of any default hereunder, each party agrees to provide a written "Failure to Comply" notice to the other party giving said party ten days in which to respond with a plan to remedy the issues outlined in the notice.

7. <u>Separation of Entities.</u> CARF and Fair acknowledge and agree that they are separate legal entities, each with their own statutory requirements, bylaws or operating agreements. CARF and Fair further acknowledge and agree that there is a duty on the part of each party not to commingle funds between the two entities.

8. <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall commence on \_\_\_\_\_, 2013, and terminate on December 31, 2013.

9. <u>Notices</u>. All notices and other communications shall be rendered as follows:

10. <u>Indemnification</u>. Each party hereto agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the other harmless against any and all losses, costs or damages which either may sustain or incur as a consequence of the other's acts or omissions in carrying out this Agreement.

11. <u>Amendments</u>. No change, amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties hereto.

12. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement may not be assigned or transferred by either party to any third party without the prior written consent of the other party.

13. <u>Attorney's Fees and Venue</u>. If an action at law or in equity is necessary to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs in addition to any other reasonable relief to which it may be entitled. With respect to any suit, action or proceeding arising out of or related to this Agreement, or the documentation related hereto, the parties

hereby submit to the jurisdiction and venue of the appropriate court in the County of Sacramento, State of California for any proceeding arising hereunder.

14. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

15. <u>Binding on Successors</u>. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the respective heirs, personal representatives, successors and assigns of the parties hereto.

16. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be construed and governed pursuant to the laws of the State of California.

#### -IMPORTANT ADVISORY-

The California Horse Racing Board staff has advised us that the Parimutuel Operations Committee plans to add an agenda item regarding satellite wagering to its June 19 meeting in Los Angeles. Please see message below from Mike Marten, Press Officer for the CHRB.

The Committee is inquiring as to whether current simulcast facility operators, including Fairs, would waive their rights to block new outlets within a 20-mile radius. Commissioner Rosenberg, chair of the committee, has asked that each satellite facility respond either in person at the meeting on June 19 or in writing.

We encourage every CARF member Fair which receives an inquiry from the CHRB to respond. If a Fair representative is unable to attend the meeting, please respond in writing. CARF representatives will be present on your behalf at the June 19 meeting.

If your Fair does not receive an inquiry from the CHRB, take no action on this matter.

As you recall, this is not a new issue. In 2010, CARF led the effort to defeat SB 1439 (Price) which would have eliminated the 20 mile radius around satellite wagering facilities. Many of you participated in that effort in order to protect the investment you have in your facility. In the alternative, CARF has worked with member fairs to grant waive the 20 mile radius when an agreement is negotiated between parties that results in fair treatment of all interested and is in the best interest of the industry. We will continue that effort into the future.

We would recommend that a written response include the following; brief and concise is best.

- 1. Reiteration that CARF representatives will be present at the meeting to respond to CHRB questions on behalf of CARF member Fairs.
- 2. Your Fair's position on whether it is willing to discuss concepts for neighboring satellite facilities on a case-by-case basis.
- 3. Whether your Fair has ever discussed development of another satellite facility within 20-miles of the existing satellite.
- 4. cc: CARF.

As you know, Commissioner Richard Rosenberg stated at the May 23 Board meeting that the Pari-Mutuel Operations Committee will be adding an item to its June 19 agenda concerning the 20-mile radius restriction. He specifically asked whether current simulcast facility operators would waive their rights to block new outlets with a 20-mile radius. He asked for an update on what new facilities are in the pipeline. He further stated he would like "the specific fair to come before us and tell us what their position is."

Accordingly, I need to send an e-mail to all wagering outlets requesting their attendance at the meeting or, if that is not possible, for a written position. I am excluding mini-satellites because it is my understanding that a new mini-satellite (e.g. Commerce Club, O.C. Tavern) does not have its own 20-mile radius restriction.
